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The Underrecognized Relationship

An estimated 5.3 million people nationwide live with TBI-related disability

> Symptoms of brain injury are **not always immediately evident** and the general public has **limited knowledge** about the diagnosis. Brain injuries may cause an increased susceptibility to a multitude of barriers in a person's life, including **difficulties overcoming incarceration, re-entering the community, and maintaining a life in the community.**

of inmates across the nation met criteria for **both** a **mental health & substance use disorder**. Some research shows that over **70%** of individuals who experience a serious mental illness or substance use disorder **have had one TBI**.
